PHASE 1 ► \$111,500

HIGH FIDELITY MANIKINS

The new Simulation Training Center will be equipped with 2 new high-fidelity manikins that simulate real-life medical scenarios. Each can produce breath sounds, heart tones, peripheral pulses, obstetric procedures, and much more. One of the manikins, dedicated to obstetrics, can simulate a baby birth, post-partum hemorrhage and much more.



Access to manikins that can provide a breadth of experiences is of high value as health care system shortages continue to surge. It ensures students gain exposure to a wide range of clinical procedures at a time when experiences in the field may be limited to areas of staffing needs. Manikins also provide instructional moments and points of reflection and evaluation that are difficult to create in real life scenarios.

STATE-OF-THE-ART SIMULATION TRAINING CENTER

Located in St. Francis Hall the training center will feature 5 simulation rooms; 1 dedicated to women and children, 3 dedicated to adult care, and 1 dedicated to specialized care and experiences. These special experiences include nurse anesthesia skills such as intubation, resuscitation, line placement, and respiratory and cardiac assessment. Students will also have access to training on electronic health records with real patient scenarios built into the system. Computers will be available at the bedsides with headwall technologies and equipment such as IV pumps delivering medications for "patients" to respond to during care experiences.

The construction of this Simulation Training Center increases the laboratory and classroom space available to our nursing students. This physical expansion allows for increased enrollment and relieves scheduling difficulties across the College of Nursing. The new technologies in the lab will also ensure Lourdes is keeping pace with the dynamic changes occurring in health care delivery.

FLASCK NURSING CENTER MODERNIZED

The Flasck Nursing Center first opened in 2005. Today it is home to a skills lab, nursing classrooms, and the Nurse Anesthesia lab and classroom. With the rapid changes occurring in healthcare, the modernization of these spaces and the equipment used in them is a top priority to best meet new standards and create realistic environments. Learning labs and classrooms will be re-designed with maximized functionality to mirror what students will encounter in healthcare facilities. This modernization will give students greater ability to pivot seamlessly to real life practice. Since the opening of the Flasck Nursing Center in 2005, the facilities within have been maintained with moderate resources. However, these facilities and equipment have now reached the term of their life span and the modernization of this Center will greatly benefit the nursing students graduating into dynamic and short-staffed workforce.


