A Magical Day

Lifelong Learners will be treated to a private magic show and tour of Abbott's Magic Company in the "Magic Capital of the World." Unholy Toledo Tour

10:00 AM – 2:00 PM, Wednesday, October 29 *Registration deadline: Oct. 8th*

Step into the shadowy world of 1930s Toledo, a time of G-Men, speakeasies, and infamous gangsters like Pretty Boy Floyd, Baby Face Nelson, and Machine Gun Kelly. Brace yourself for the gripping tale of Thomas Yonnie Licavoli and his Detroit mob, who descended upon Toledo in 1931, leaving a trail of violence unlike anything the city had seen before—14 murders in just 36 months.

Historian Tedd Long will take us on a journey back in time to Toledo's darkest days, when the Tenderloin district rivaled the city's gambling halls in notoriety. Find the former illicit hotspots and hangouts of the Licavoli Gang, the enigmatic club owner Jack Kennedy, kingpin Jimmy Hayes, and a colorful cast of characters—each meticulously researched and historically accurate.

The tour's climax centers around the most sensational crime of the era: the July 1933 assassination of Jack Kennedy, a young club owner and bootlegger, in Point Place. Experience Jack's gripping story firsthand during this two-hour driving tour, spanning downtown Toledo and the city's northern reaches.

The Arts Commission and Community Engagement

Founded in 1959 as the City Culture Commission, The Arts Commission compiled the city's first comprehensive local arts calendar beginning in 1960. In 1977, significant legislation passed that cemented The Arts Commission's role in the community with the founding of the City of Toledo's One Percent for Art program. Overseen by The Arts Commission's Art in Public Places Committee, the program allocates a portion of City funds for public art. Toledo's One Percent for Art program was the first in Ohio, among the first in the nation, and has since served as the adopted model for other regional agencies. It continues to this day and features an impressive collection of over 100 public art installations with work from more than 80 local, national, and international artists installed in nearly every neighborhood in the

World War II Stolen & Looted Art

It is not widely known how extensive this looting was and how it impacted the war. This occurred in many invaded and occupied countries, and because of the value of these works of art, it led to deliberate strategies. This theft and looting were carried out not only by the Axis powers but also, to some extent, by the Allied nations. The tour will involve the viewing of the works at the Toledo Museum of Art with WWII provenance.

This tour will feature around 15 of the most popular public art pieces located in downtown Toledo and will follow a new accessible route developed as part of a partnership with the Ability Center of Greater Toledo to create more accessible tools and resources for public art in Toledo.

The Gospel of Mark: An Examination, not a Bible Study

This course will look into the Gospel of Mark, to investigate who its author and intended audience were. Mark is generally accepted as the first Gospel written, and its form established the basic pattern of the other canonical Gospels. We will also look at Mark's sources of information for his writing, as well as some examination of how Mark was used in the other Gospels.

Paul Mueller is an adjunct instructor of theology at Lourdes University. He received his Master of Arts degree in theology at Lourdes in 2011, and his doctorate in theology at Duquesne University in Pittsburgh in 2021. He is an active member of St. Joseph Parish in Sylvania.

Constitutional Law: The Earl Warren Court (1953-69) revolutionizes post-World War II American law and society

The War of Independence, 1775-83, was, of course, known as The American Revolution, while the ratification of the 14th Amendment in 1868 has been deemed "The Second Founding" or "The Second Revolution." Less widely recognized is a third revolution, commenced almost 100 years later, when the still mostly unfulfilled promises of the 14th Amendment began to be realized by the rulings of nine men in black robes. Decisions were made by the Warren Court that would drag an often reluctant America into the second half of the 20th century. The reaction was so fierce that billboards urging "Impeach Earl Warren" soon dotted America's new highways. Rocking the very culture, the Supreme Court outcomes profoundly affected those accused of

crimes; gay couples; interracial couples; users of birth control; consumers of pornography; the free press; school children reciting prayers; individuals expressing political viewpoints; and minorities seeking protection of civil rights. Become enlightened about some of the parties who brought the cases to the Court as well as the justices who ruled on them. Vote on the best and worst cases. Finally, in the last riveting hours of our class, learn about the most impactful and interesting cases of the U.S. Supreme Court's most recent term.

Dr. Shari O'Brien has doctorates in English and law; she worked in United States District Court and practiced law for thirty-five years. Publishing five law review articles as well as hundreds of essays and poems in national journals, she taught writing and poetry for twenty-seven years at UT and continues to write poetry today.

A Survey of Revolutionary France in the 18th Century: Names, Dates, Outcomes

We have all read some facts about the French Revolution, which started in 1789 and, by

some accounts, ended with Napoleon taking power of the country in 1799. To put this information in context, this course will give a timeline of key events and include information about the major players. The surprising role of women in a decisive event will be highlighted. There will be extensive information about one leader who had a strong connection with the U.S., the Marquis de Lafayette. His life will be described through the writings of Mike Duncan in his book Hero of Two Worlds. Interesting fact: Layette actually visited Ohio late in this life. A final section of the course will describe France at the end of these troubled times as they faced the 19th Century.

Voltaire: The Patriarch of the French Enlightenment

L. Paul Hood, Jr., JD, LL.M. 10:00 - 11:30 AM, Thursdays October 2 – October 16 (3 weeks) *** Exclusively online *** Registration deadline: Sept. 24th

François-Marie Arouet (1694-1778), known by his nom de plume. Voltaire, was an uber-prolific 18th century writer, philosopher, poet, dramatist, playwright, historian, and polemicist; indeed, Le Patriarche of the French Enlightenment. Famous for his mordant wit and his criticism of Christianity (especially of the Roman Catholic Church) and of slavery. Voltaire was an advocate of freedom of speech, freedom of religion, and separation of church and state. Session 1 will focus on Voltaire's Jesuit education and youth marked by poetry, paternal conflict, and brushes with French nobility. Session 2 will examine Voltaire's life with Madame du Châtelet and his unhappy time in the court of King Frederick the Great of Prussia, as well as his writings during this period, including Candide. The final session will review Voltaire's time seignorial estate, Ferney, and its importance as an intellectual capitol, his last writings, his return to Paris and the outrageous story of his burial as a non-Roman Catholic in France.

A native of Lousiana, Paul Hood obtained his undergraduate and law degrees from Louisiana State University and an LL.M. in taxation from Georgetown University Law Center before settling down in the New Orleans area. Paul has taught at the University of Toledo College of Law and Ohio Northern University Pettit College of Law. A passionate history buff, Paul teaches history of tax law, and he has taught courses and given numerous speeches about a wide variety of historical subjects from the history of the papacy/popes to the governors of Louisiana.

Accompanied by slides and lectures, several major documents from ancient Egypt, Mesopotamia (Babylonia and Assyria), and Syria will be read and discussed. These will include the "Creation Epic," the "Epic of Gilgamesh" (that includes a flood story similar to Noah's in the Bible), the Law Code of Hammurabi, Sennacherib's siege of Jerusalem, the Egyptian "Hymn to the Aton," and the "Interpretation of Dreams" (Egyptian and Babylonian). Discussions will include the basic history and culture surrounding these documents and a dozen other texts as well (as selected by attendees).

Richard (Dick) Ward studied Assyriology at The University of Chicago and received a Ph.D. in Ancient History from the University of Minnesota. He taught ancient history and Biblical studies for ten years before changing to property tax assessment, specializing in computer assisted mass appraisal (CAMA). He worked on mass appraisal projects for forty years in the USA

(including Toledo), Russia, South Africa, and ten other countries. He is a Christian and serves in St. Matthew's Episcopal Church as well as at Sylvania Area Family Services. He is married to (the former) Linda Douglas of Toledo, has a son in Eugene, OR, and a daughter in Seattle, WA.

In cities around the nation, violence erupts in conflicts between police and federal troops and workers striking for improved conditions. Increasing numbers of immigrants arrive seeking refuge and opportunity. In the West, Native Americans and

The 15th Amendment, which granted voting rights to former slaves and freed men, was ratified in 1870. - Mail-ins received before 8/20/25 will not be entered in our system until *after that date*. You'll get an email once it's entered.
- Due to ongoing postal issues, mail-in registrations will no longer be accepted starting Spring 2026.

For security purposes, credit card payment will no longer be accepted by mail. You may pay online with a credit card via our secure server. A 2% processing fee is added to all credit card payments.

REFUND POLICY

Lifelong Learning will refund money for classes, trips, and events under only two circumstances:

- 1) If Lifelong Learning cancels or changes the dates/times of an event after the student has paid.
- 2) A person becomes so severely ill that hospitalization is required. Students have 30 days from the class date (or date of the 1st class, for multi-week class) to notify us if such an emergency occurred.


