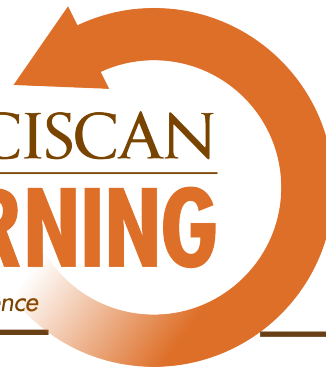

Shipshewana Amish Country

8:00 AM – 6:30 PM, Wednesday, June 10th

Join us for a day of exploration in Shipshewana, Indiana's Amish Country! We'll start our day with a guided tour at the Menno-Hof cultural center, which teaches visitors about the faith and life of Amish and Mennonites. Their multi-image presentations, historical

environments, and colorful displays will take us on a fascinating journey inside their unique world.

Next, we'll head to an Amish home for a traditional haystack meal, a build-your-own layered dish. It starts off with a base layer of crackers or rice, followed by your choice of meat, beans, vegetables, cheese and/or sauces. You'll also have your choice of apple, blueberry, or butterscotch cream pie for dessert.

We'll then head back into town to enjoy the gigantic outdoor Shipshewana Flea Market, stopping to see a Quilt Garden or two along the Heritage Trail on our way. Be sure to bring your shopping bags, as you'll find bargains on home decor, clothing, produce, plants, tools, crafts, books, beauty supplies, accessories, handmade items, vintage items and everything imaginable! Bring cash if you'd like to rent a scooter—rentals are \$25 cash for 2 hours.

A Day of Lavender & Wine

Join us for a special day featuring delectable wine and soothing lavender! Our first main attraction will be Chateau Winery & Vineyard, where we'll meet the owners and partake in a wine-tasting before enjoying a lunch of sliders, veggies, cheese & crackers. Next, we'll take a self-guided tour of the vineyard and a production tour with the winemaker. Afterward, we'll have a bit of time for everyone to shop their selection of bottled wines or sit and enjoy their beautiful outdoor area and koi pond.

We'll then head to Luckey Road Lavender Farm, where one family's love of lavender blooms across multiple fragrant varieties and 850 beautiful plants in Pemberville, Ohio. We'll be guided through their purple-painted fields as we learn about the history of the farm and pick our own lavender to take home. Of course, we'll also save time for shopping natural bath and body products in their farm shop before heading back to campus.

Schedel Arboretum & Gardens

9:15 AM – 3:00 PM, Wednesday, July 8

Enjoy a beautiful day outdoors at the stunning Schedel Arboretum & Gardens in Elmore, Ohio. With a mission of offering opportunities for the study and appreciation of nature and the arts, this trip is perfect for nature- and art-lovers alike. In addition to many unusual and exotic species of trees and upwards of 8,000 annual plants and flowers, the Schedel Arboretum & Gardens maintains several themed garden displays where one will find unique

presentations of plants and hardscapes designed to enhance the experience of appreciating nature, including a traditional Japanese garden with torii gate, a rose garden, a tropical garden, a world class bonsai collection, and more.

First, we'll take a guided tour on golf carts to learn about the history, plants, and art of the gardens. Then, we'll meet with a bonsai expert to learn all about these unique trees. Finally, we'll visit the Blair Museum of Lithophanes on site, featuring the largest collection of lithophanes in the world. Lithophanes are fine carvings made in wax and dye, then cast with thin layers of porcelain. Once backlit, the result is a luminous, sepia-toned etching.

Upon wrapping up our fascinating tour, we will be treated to an al fresco lunch of sandwiches, pasta salad, chips, cookies, and beverages.

S.A.V.E. Eco-Tour: Hidden Lake Gardens

Join us for a special tour of Hidden Lake Gardens in Tipton, MI, co-organized by the Science Alliance for Valuing the Environment. Located in the scenic Irish Hills of Southeast Michigan, Hidden Lake Gardens is a 755-acre botanical garden that provides visitors with 12 miles of hiking trails, a conservatory, arboretum, bonsai garden, canopy walk, and more. It is owned by Michigan State University and has a mission to connect, inspire, and engage people with the beauty of plants and the wonder of our natural world.

Upon arrival, attendees will be welcome to explore the Visitor's Center and/or conservatory on foot before taking a bus tour of the arboretum with the Managing Director of the gardens, Paul Pfeifer. Paul's oversight of the gardens incorporates curating the arboretum and plant collections. He has been involved in public and ornamental horticulture for over 30 years.

After our tour of the gardens, we'll enjoy a delicious lunch at local favorite, Danley's Country House. The restaurant was established in 1966 and is currently operated by a third-generation owner. Our menu will feature a delectable selection of handhelds, hearty salads, meatloaf,

and more. Vegetarian, vegan, and gluten-free diets can also be accommodated.

Zekelman Holocaust Center

9:00 AM – 4:00 PM, Wednesday, August 12

Founded in 1984, The Zekelman Holocaust Center is a dynamic institution in Farmington Hills, Michigan, that features a newly renovated museum, research and library archive, special exhibit galleries, educational workshops, and public programming. With a mission to engage, educate, and empower, the center aims to combat rising antisemitism by presenting content that focuses on Holocaust victims' and survivors' personal stories to help visitors understand how the Holocaust could have happened. The museum aims to provide visitors with tools to stand up to hatred and antisemitism wherever they arise, with the ultimate goal of creating a more tolerant and empathetic society.

Our special program for Lifelong Learners will include a museum tour, next generation speaker, a catered lunch, and an educational program. The latter will discuss antisemitism in the United States with a focus on understanding the impact of antisemitism on individuals and institutions. Attendees will be encouraged to think critically about the U.S. response to Nazi ideology and make connections to ongoing antisemitism at home. We will also discuss tools and approaches to contemporary genocide prevention, looking at the United States' responses to the genocides in Rwanda, Bosnia, and Guatemala. By deepening understanding of the Holocaust and its broader lessons, attendees will be empowered to counter hatred and prejudice today.

Our catered hot Kosher lunch will feature an Israeli buffet of falafel, herb tomato salmon, grilled vegetables, salad, hummus, dessert, and more. Vegan & gluten-free options are included.

Art in Public Places: Toledo's One Percent for Art Program

Founded in 1959 as the City Culture Commission, The Arts Commission compiled the city's first comprehensive local arts calendar beginning in 1960. By the end of the decade, the organization was brought under the City's Division of Parks, Recreation, and Forestry to aid in public art investments at Crosby Gardens (now Toledo Botanical Gardens).

In 1977 significant legislation passed that cemented The Arts Commission's role in the community with the founding of the City of Toledo's One Percent for Art program. Overseen by The Arts Commission's Art in Public Places Committee, the program allocates a portion of City funds for public art. Toledo's One Percent for

Art program was the first in Ohio, among the first in the nation, and has since served as the adopted model for other regional agencies. It continues to this day and features an impressive collection of over 150 pieces of public art with work from more than 100 local, national, and international artists installed in nearly every neighborhood in the city.

Join us for an overview of the program, highlights from the collection and a sneak peek of upcoming public art projects for 2026 and '27.

Nathan Mattimoe has managed the Art in Public Places program for thirteen years and has been Director of the program for four years. He has a BA in Sculpture from the University of Toledo and is currently the Board Chair for Toledo Design Collective, a nonprofit organization dedicated to improving the function and aesthetic of the Toledo region. He is also a visual artist, DJ and music producer.

Environmental Activism: Lake Erie Advocates

Join us for a discussion about the work of Lake Erie Advocates, whose ongoing mission is to safeguard the health of our lake from the environmental threat caused by factory farms and other sources.

Mike Ferner is the founder of Lake Erie Advocates, a grass roots local environmental group that has been meeting since 2016 in response to the Toledo water crisis. Mike's environmental activism began in Toledo in the mid 1970's after reading articles about nuclear power, prompting him to organize the Toledo Coalition for Safe Energy. As an independent member of Toledo City Council, Mike sponsored a million-dollar investment in energy efficiency for city buildings, the largest such program undertaken in Ohio at that time.

Natives of the Maumee Valley

Living in Northwest Ohio, the Natives of the Maumee Valley relied on the land's resources for survival. Learn about trading, clothing and other aspects of daily life and culture of the 1790s Maumee Valley.

Dr. Shannon Hughes has worked with Metroparks Toledo for 20 years and is the Director of Education and Programming as well as Metroparks' Historian, responsible for a staff of 50 and interpretive programming for over 150,000 visitors district-wide. She holds a Bachelor's of Arts from Hiram College and a Master's in Public Administration as well as a Doctorate in Leadership and Policy Studies in Human Development from BGSU. She is also a *Certified Interpretive Planner* and a *Certified Interpretive Trainer* through the National Association of Interpretation and a *Certified National Geographic Educator*. She was also a recipient of the 20 Under 40 Leadership Award in 2022.

National Museum of the Great Lakes

The Great Lakes are one of the world's most vital natural resources—and home to thousands of years of powerful human stories. The National Museum of the Great Lakes preserves, shares, and celebrates those stories through immersive exhibits, hands-on experiences, and dynamic programming that bring history to life.

Join us for a special tour of the museum's 500+ artifacts, engaging interactives, and powerful stories across nine exhibit galleries—including *Currents of Change*, a temporary exhibit about the changing ecology of the Great Lakes. After our guided tour, attendees will be free to roam on their own to shop in the museum store and/or explore the 617-foot *Col. James M. Schoonmaker* Museum Ship (some may remember it as the *Willis B. Boyer*) and the historic Museum Tug *Ohio* for a one-of-a-kind, on-the-water experience. *** *NOTE: The ships are historical artifacts and therefore not ADA-compliant. Attendees wishing to explore these artifacts will need to climb stairs to enter them.*

CLASSES

Nazareth Hall: A History based on the Order of the Sacred Hearts

June 9 – June 30 (4 weeks)

This four-session course will begin by tracing the beginning of the Ursuline Order in Europe to America. The vocational philosophy of the Ursuline Order and how it contributed to early American History will be explained, beginning in New Orleans. The next two sessions will cover the introduction of the Ursuline Order to NW Ohio and eventually Toledo. It will continue from there to directly address the construction of Nazareth Hall in 1925 to the present time. During the sessions there will be a historical slide

presentation of Nazareth Hall. The final session will be dedicated to discussion of Tom Sorosiak's recently published book about Nazareth Hall.

Note: Students will have the option to purchase Tom's book, *Nazareth Hall: A History Based on the Ursuline Order of the Sacred Heart's Vision for Education*, in class. The book retails for \$20. **Please come prepared with cash or check if you'd like to purchase a book from Tom.**

Tom Sorosiak retired from teaching in the History Department at BGSU. He has taught a graduate course and workshops on Holocaust education and genocide.

ONLINE CLASS: Appearing Tonight, the ORIGINAL...? The Fascinating and Tortured History of the Drifters and the Platters

L. Paul Hood, Jr., JD, LL.M.

June 11 – 18 (2 weeks)

This course covers the fascinating and complex history of two of rock 'n roll's most successful and storied groups: the Drifters and the Platters. Both formed in the early 1950's on different coasts (the Drifters in New York, and the Platters in Los Angeles). The Drifters enjoyed top-40 recording success in both the United States and Great Britain over more than a 20-year period, selling more than 200 million records. The Platters produced chart-topping records for over a decade and sold over 80 million records. But with commercial success often comes litigation, and, in the cases of the Platters and the Drifters, it came in boatloads. There are more than 200 reported judicial decisions involving litigation around either the Drifters or the Platters. In this course, Paul will make a case for the proposition that the legal organization of both groups is what led to the flood of litigation.

A native of Louisiana, Paul Hood obtained his undergraduate and law degrees from Louisiana State University and an LL.M. in taxation from Georgetown University Law Center before settling down in the New Orleans area. Paul has taught at the University of Toledo College of Law and Ohio Northern University Pettit College of Law. A passionate history buff, Paul teaches history of tax law, and he has taught courses and given numerous speeches about a wide variety of historical subjects from the history of the papacy to the governors of Louisiana.

The Science of Reading

This course breaks down the body of research known as the "Science of Reading" in a clear, practical way. We will explore how the brain learns to read as well as literacy models that inform effective reading instruction. We will discuss phonemic awareness, phonics, fluency, vocabulary, and comprehension. This class will include examples, tools, and ideas you can use to

help children grow into confident, capable readers.

Dr. Lindsay Vance joined the Lourdes community in 2021 and served as an Assistant Professor and Program Coordinator of Teacher Education in partnership with Tiffin University. With over 15 years of experience in elementary and middle school classrooms, she is passionate about literacy instruction, multicultural education, and effective teaching practices. Dr. Vance works to ensure course alignment with the Science of Reading and is actively involved in professional education organizations focused on improving literacy instruction across the state.

Exploring Women's Experience Through Clay

June 17 – July 8 (4 weeks)

Since ancient times, women have been drawn to vessels for gathering. Our bodies are vessels, as well, and our "gatherings" can include stories and memories, secrets and intentions. We will look at images, do a little freeform journaling and brainstorming, and create objects of personal, spiritual and symbolic meaning.

Classes begin with a brief lecture and slide show with examples of ancient and contemporary clay work. Using some basic hand-forming techniques and the magical, malleable medium of clay, join us to explore this primal connection to our ancestors and the earth. No clay experience required.

* **Week 1: The Gathering Vessel:** Consider the role of the vessel in anthropological records, and create a container to hold totems of your inner world. (As in all your projects, you can choose whether to share the meanings of your creations, or keep them personal.)

* **Week 2: The Personal Altar:** Learn about the variety and beauty of household altars across time and cultures, then do some brainstorming and create your own altar, for the sacred or the mundane. Honor an ancestor or loved one, glorify a daily ritual, or create a spot for meditation.

* **Week 3: The Four Elements:** The clay is both water and earth. In this class, we finish and decorate our previous projects, learn about

primitive firing techniques, and experiment with our own “air and fire” processes in finishing clay.
* **Week 4: The Village:** after brainstorming about our own comforts and material needs, we will engage our sense of play and consider both the personal and a sense of community by building a village in clay. This will be a collaborative project as well as a final gathering to celebrate, show and discuss the work we have completed during this course.

Kelly Averill-Savino is a local artist with a graduate degree in Folklore and an MFA in Ceramics. Her interests in ancient clay and cultural traditions inspire her work.

All materials will be provided, and you’ll get to keep them so you can continue practicing at home.

ONLINE CLASS:

Europe on a Verge of Far-Right Revolution

Jarosław Szczepański

12:00 – 1:15 PM, Monday, June 29

Registration deadline: Jun. 23rd

In this timely lecture, explore the dramatic evolution of Europe's political landscape from 2025 to projected scenarios for 2027. The presentation traces the deepening divide between pro-EU centrists, liberals, and rising conservative-nationalist forces often labeled anti-woke or reformist—a shift that increasingly overrides traditional left-right lines.

Drawing on 2025 parliamentary compositions, averaged polling trends, and country-specific dynamics (with a focus on Poland, France, Germany, the UK, and others), the talk examines drivers like migration crises, war fatigue in Ukraine, economic pressures, and institutional tensions (e.g., cohabitation risks in France or presidential vetoes in Poland). It presents two forecast variants for 2027: a moderate scenario with gains in Poland, the UK (potential Reform UK surge and early elections), and limited ripple effects; and a maximalist one involving breakthroughs in France (National Rally presidential win) and possibly Germany, leading to a broader conservative-nationalist bloc, potential EU decentralization, altered qualified majority voting dynamics in the Council, and strains in NATO/transatlantic ties.

Participants will gain insight into key leaders (e.g., Jordan Bardella, Alice Weidel, Giorgia Meloni, Sławomir Mentzen), the fragility of current centrist cordons sanitaires, and whether Europe faces a true "counterrevolution" or contained adjustments.

Students can expect a balanced, evidence-based discussion of risks, opportunities, and implications for European integration—no crystal ball, but grounded projections from real data and trends. This class is ideal for those interested in current affairs, history's echoes, and what might come next for the continent.

Jarosław Szczepański trained as a political scientist and lawyer and currently works as an assistant professor from the University of Warsaw in Poland. He was a 2021 Fulbright Fellow at OSU and recently conducted research at Victoria University of Wellington.

Seeing History Through Impressionist Art

Impressionism is one of the most popular art movements, even with people who claim not to appreciate art. This session is an opportunity to discuss why this art is so engaging and explore what these images reveal about dramatic changes in the world of visual art. Elevation in the Vineyard: How Altitude Shapes Wine

Elevation is one of the most powerful yet often overlooked factors influencing the character of wine. In this class, we explore how vineyards planted at different altitudes create dramatically different expressions of the same grape varieties.

Higher elevations typically experience cooler temperatures, greater diurnal temperature swings, increased sunlight intensity, and slower ripening cycles. Lower elevation vineyards, by contrast, tend to produce wines that are fuller-bodied, richer, and more fruit-forward due to warmer growing conditions and faster ripening. Through a guided tasting of six wines sourced from both high-altitude and low-elevation vineyards around the world, participants will experience how elevation influences grape ripening, acidity, tannin development, and flavor intensity.

Kintsugi ("golden joinery") is the ancient Japanese art repairing broken pottery with lacquer and gold. In kintsugi the repaired piece is viewed as stronger and more beautiful, healed and transformed. In this class we will practice the art by intentionally breaking a piece of simple pottery. Using epoxy and gold embossing compound, we will simulate the ancient art of kintsugi. After growing comfortable with the process, we will repair another piece that might have some history for you. The process of repair can be freeing. Mending, patching, and transforming broken parts creates something new and beautiful. Conversation and noticing your own process will be encouraged in the class.

Climate & Wine: From Cool and Rainy to Hot and Dry

Climate is one of the most powerful forces shaping the character of wine. Temperature, rainfall, sunlight, and growing season length all influence how grapes ripen, affecting acidity, sugar levels, flavor intensity, and structure. In this class, we explore how wines from **cool, wetter climates** differ from wines grown in **warm, dry regions**. Cool climates tend to produce wines with higher acidity, lighter body, and more delicate aromatics. Warmer climates, by contrast, often create wines that are fuller-bodied, richer,

and more fruit-forward due to increased ripeness and sugar accumulation.

Through a guided tasting of six wines sourced from contrasting wine regions around the world, participants will learn how climate shapes grape development and ultimately determines the style of the finished wine.

Along the way we will discuss the science behind grape ripening, how growers adapt to different climates, and how climate change is reshaping the global wine map.

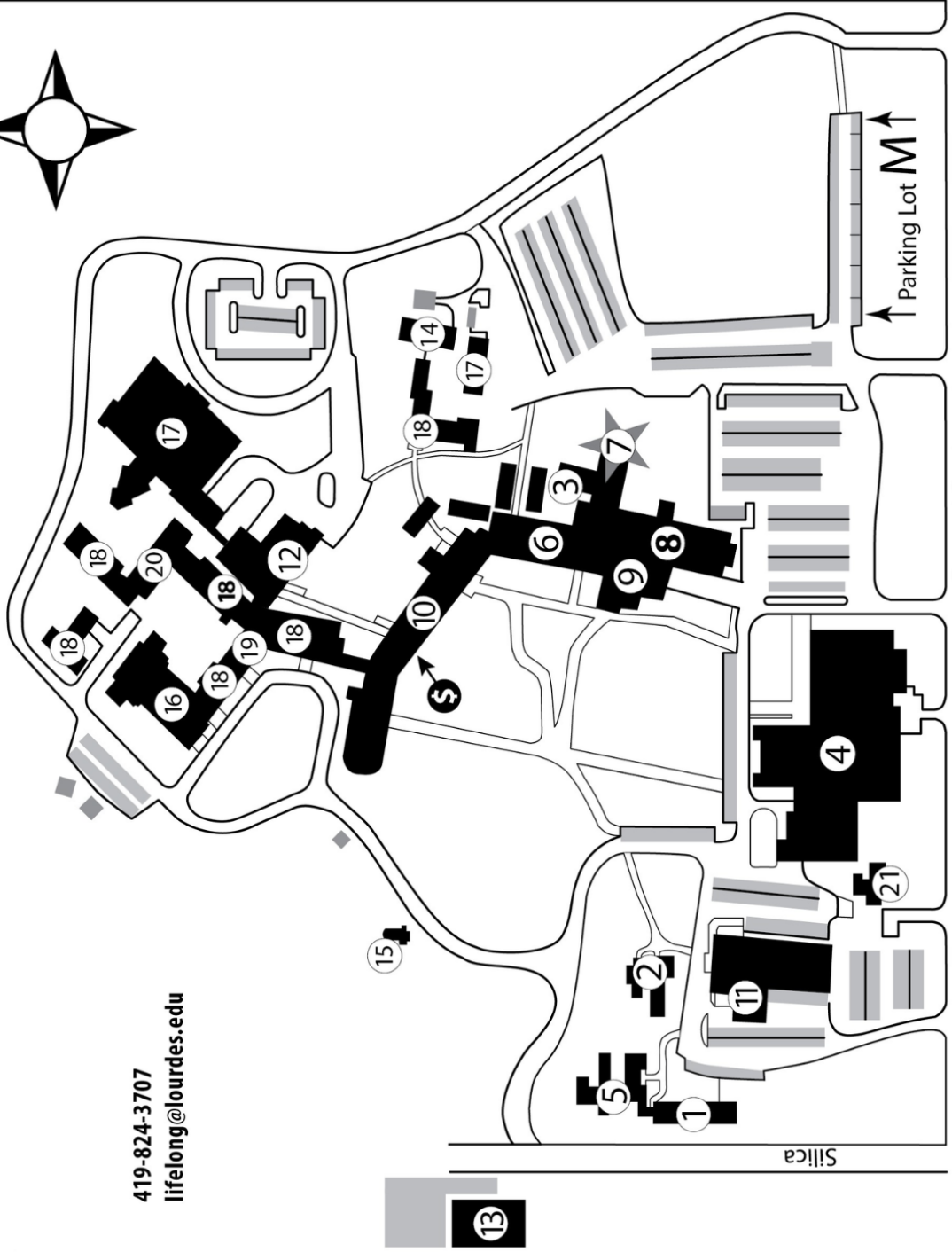
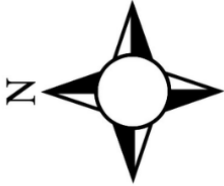
